## C. J. (Jeremy) Morse will be 80 on 10 December. Over the course of

 the Azed series, and the Ximenes series before that, he has established himself as the most brilliant and successful competitive clue writer of all, with a long string of outstanding clues to his credit, many of which have won prizes.
